GUESS WHAT! We have offended some members of the community yet again. It would seem that whatever we do, however well intended, that we will offend someone. Parents are you aware of the growing concerns regarding the consumption of alcohol in the hall by teenagers!!! It has been decided by the committee, that we cannot accept the responsibility of other peoples children, consuming alcohol in the hall. Either with or without their parents knowledge. In future if teenagers wish to bring alcohol into the hall and are known to be under 18, they will be asked to leave the building. Their parents will be notified of the reasons why they were asked to leave.

With regard to unaccompanied children being left in our care, on a person level, we do not mind, but the question arose recently about how we stand legally. Our legal position is being looked into and we will keep you informed.

MILL HILL

Did you know that the site of the village hall and garden, Was called Mill Hill, 200 years ago. The land was given to the poor of the parish and was managed by the overseers of the poor and the Church wardens. Today it is held in trust, by the charities commission, and managed by the village hall committee, under the supervision of the trustees. The village hall committee was formed around 10 years ago. And rented the building and gardens from the charities commission, when the W.I. gave up the lease. After the renovations, the charities commission increased the annual rent from around £20 to £500. It has only remained open, by the hard work of the previous committee's fund the hire charge from the education authority, (after the arson attack on the school) and donations from kind people to this registered charity. (No. 1003854).


