Sorry for the confusion and the long walk back from the village amenities area near the Cemetery (otherwise known as the playing fields).

Village Hall Roof: (Otherwise known as the Withernwick Ski Slope). The roof has been leaking quite badly over the wet period that we have had recently (thanks kids!!). The men on our committee are going to mend it soon but in the mean time, if it's raining and you would like to have a shower, bring your soap and towel to the village hall

and we will only charge 50p.

<u>Parents:</u> We put a warning in the last issue of the newsletter, telling everyone of our intention to use anticlimb paint. It's a sticky black substance and if any parent would like to find out how to remove it from their children's clothes etc, please feel free to contact any member of the village hall committee, who will negotiate with you, your contribution towards the costs of repairing the damage that your child has done to the roof. Instead of paying rent money, they pay our insurance bill, which is only effective while a booking is taking place. Therefore if your children play there, when the hall is not booked, they are not covered by any insurance, if anyone is still confused by this here it is again in black and white. NOT COUNCIL PROPERTY, NOT COVERED BY COUNCIL INSURANCE! We would, because of requests from neighbours, Parish Councillors, and very tired committee members, like to politely ask all of the kids that use the garden, to leave and go home or play elsewhere by 9.30 pm each night. Call it a curfew if you like, and don't forget kids that the neighbours are quite within their rights to call the police out to you if you are causing a nuisance to them. We would like everyone to respect the village hall garden as they would their parents gardens, in other words what your parents don't allow you to do in their garden — don't do in our village hall garden. Thank you for your co-operation.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR GIVING YOUR CAT'A PILL

1. Pick your cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. WHAT DO YOU WANT TO BE WHEN YOU GROW UP

From the age of 5, I knew that I wanted to be a teacher. I didn't go via the usual route however, that my friends did. After leaving Bridlington High School for girls I did not go straight to college. I chose to work for a year, as a student teacher, working alongside practising teachers in a school. I did my year at Cross Hill infant school in Driffield. I enjoyed every minute of it, and went to college armed with a wealth of practical experience. I trained at Bingley Teacher Training College for 3 years, studying art as main subject, and maths as a subsidiary.

My first teaching post was in Hull, on Bilton Grange Estate, the school now known as Griffin. From there I went back to Driffield, to teach again at Cross Hill for a short period, before moving on to St. Mary's in Beverley. My first appointment coincided with the opening of the new St. Mary's in Molescroft. It was to be an open plan and vertically grouped school - a new innovation in those days, and to prove an invaluable experience for my time at Withernwick. I took several years out after Beverley, to raise my 2 children, Rachel and Matthew. When they went to nursery school, I was able to do some supply teaching, which took me to Hornsea, Rise, Aldbrough and other schools in the locality. One Friday, whilst waiting in Hornsea playground to collect my 2 children, the Head Teacher came to meet me, and asked if I would consider teaching a 4 year old child who was due to start school at short notice. He was a child with a rare heart condition who needed one to one tuition. I agreed and began on the Monday. It was for mornings only, as that was all the child could manage. After 2 years in this post, I was approached by another head - this time from Withernwick school, and asked to teach juniors for 1/2 the time table. This proved a real dilemma for me. I had never taught juniors before and was thoroughly enjoying my specialised job. However, after visiting the school several times, I was persuaded, and that's how I came to spend 18 years at Withernwick. When I first started in 1981, things were very different to the school we know today. Mr C Turner was the Head Teacher and Mrs Jane Watt was the infant teacher. I was the replacement for Mrs Ruth Boasman, as she was emigrating to Australia.

In those days we had no national curriculum, only a list of subjects to cover. Teachers could basically choose when and however they wished to teach subjects. Time tables, record keeping etc. were left to the teachers discretion. My first impression of the school, was a very free and easy, relaxed, friendly and family orientated place. There were approximately 50 children, lunchtimes were friendly, pleasant occasions, when each member of staff sat with a small group of children. Family members were usually kept together. There were only 2 dinner ladies, Mrs Smith, and Mrs

Carr. The lunches were brought in each day from Hornsea, by Mr and Mrs Len Smith.

In the play ground, was not only a climbing frame, but a well loved swing, which hung from the horse chestnut tree on 2 long chains. Both playgrounds were in use at the same time, which meant that the teacher on duty had to keep popping through the junior cloakroom to supervise both areas. (Teachers cars were always parked outside the school).

When the year 5 and 6 children went on their annual visit to Borrowdale, I would replace Mr Turner in the junior classroom for the week. Peripatetic heads as such, hadn't been invented. During my 18 years at Withernwick I saw many changes. My job changed from juniors to infants, it also fluctuated from being ½ a week to ½ a day as numbers dropped, and then to full time. I worked under 4 head teachers during this period. I have always liked to keep in touch with past pupils and colleagues, and I am still in touch with people from all the schools I have taught at. Some of the 'children' who still write are now in their mid 30's. It is lovely to see how they have turned out. So, past pupils from 1981 to present time - I'D LOVE TO HEAR FROM YOU. I will reply to every letter, and you never know, we might still be corresponding in 30 years time! You might be able to remind me of incidents at school that I have long forgotten. And for the present, what am I doing now? Lots of things that I have always wanted to do and never had the time for. I line dance at Long Riston. You may be interested to know that 2 other Withernwick residents also go to the same class. Once every 6 weeks I meet up with Miss Collinson, a past head teacher of Withernwick, and our 2 ex-colleagues from Long Riston school. The 2 schools used to work closely together, and the 4 of us still meet up for what usually turns out to be a long walk, chat and lunch together. I am also doing lots of gardening, willow weaving, reading, drawing, biking, decorating, helping with the cows, chickens, geese etc. I don't know how I found the time to teach! Also I am really enjoying doing illuminated calligraphy - to commemorate birthdays, weddings, christenings, births, meaning of names and other special occasions. I am building up quite a little part-time industry, as they make personalised presents that cannot be bought in the shops. Please contact me if you would like more details, or indeed if you just want to write, I look forward to hearing from you.
