By the time you read this it will all be over (the referendum that is) and we shall know whether we are to stay in Europe or not. Whatever the result the campaigning was marred by the senseless murder of Jo Cox, MP—someone who was passionate not just about what she believed was the 'right' way forward, but also about the people she represented whatever creed or colour.

The roles we all have in society give us multiple identities and this is true for the church as well. Christians in this benefice we belong to the Church of England through the Diocese of York, but we also belong to the worldwide Anglican Communion - our identity is not confined to a single place. This is something that St Paul at various times was very keen to emphasise - although he was Jewish, as a tribe of Benjamin and a Pharisee, he was also a Roman citizen and a Greek-speaker from Tarsus. He was proud of his multiple identities on earth, but a pains to point out that our real citizenship is in heaven. Ultimately, as Bishop Alison implied in her sermon at Withernwick, heaven is our goal and yet we talk little about it so perhaps this is something we should do more often!

Our identity is naturally 'in Christ' and whilst we belong to a specific parish, we worship more often than not as a Benefice – a group of parishes. Of course we naturally have a particular allegiance to one church, but we to come together regularly to give praise and thanks to God and to offer support and encouragement to one another throughout all the ups and downs of this earthly life.

As we look forward to some summer sunshine (hopefully) I pray that you will all find time to reflect (as Matthew points out on the front cover) on God's glorious creation, rather than on whether we're European or British!
