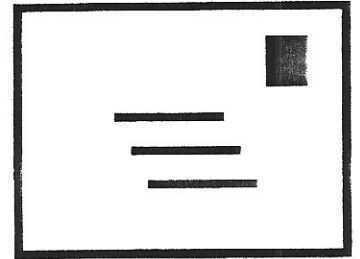

CHEAP AT HALF THE PRICE ?

In 1857 Lorne Terrace consisted of 4 Cottages or dwelling houses (being formerly 3), 3 outbuildings, a Garth and orchard and was owned by Mr William Graves Walgate who was a farmer and lived at Westhill, Aldbrough. Lorne Terrace was bounded on the East by the late Thomas King at the Parsonage House and Garth, on the North and West by the open fields of Withernwick and on the High Road to the South. They were occupied by tenants who at that time were George Fenby, Rebecca Bell, Martin Hunt, Christopher Bell and Fanny North. Mr Walgate sold the property to Mr John Bell and his wife Hannah for £180. There was a clause in the indenture which said that if Mr Bell defaulted on the payment then Mr Walgate could take the rents from the tenants and auction the property publicly.

At 3 o'clock in the afternoon on Wednesday 3rd July 1867 a public Auction took place at the "Inn or Public House known by the sign on the gate" in Withernwick. Mr Walgate sold the property known as Lorne Terrace to the highest bidder who was Mr Henry Hobson of Swine. His bid for £205 "of lawful English money" was the highest.

In 1876 Henry Hobson gave access to the chapel trustees who were Henry Barr a joiner from Sigglesthorne, William Dunn a labourer from Hatfield, James Thompson and John Wise who were both labourers from Bewholme, and the Reverend Charles Thomas Coulbeck of Hornsea.

Somewhere between 1876 and 1886 William Fox of Withernwick bought Lorne Terrace because he died 2nd October 1904 but his will was dated 17th August 1886. In his will he left his houses, gardens and land in Withernwick to his wife Charlotta Fox for life and after her decease he bequeathed the same to Francis Tesseyman a carrier of the Land of Green Ginger, Hull. Charlotta died in March 1922 and is buried at Withernwick. (There was a bit of a hiccup in William Fox's will when it was proved in October 1905 because, by mistake, Francis had been name as Frank!)

By July 1922 the tenants of Lorne Terrace had changed again and were now W. Fisher, T. Crawford, F. Swift and G. Redfern. Three months after Charlotta died, Francis sold the Terrace for £490 to William Cressey a retired Machinist of Ellerby. William and his wife Sarah Ann and son William Thomas were living at the Post Office at Skirlaugh when William senior died in January 1937. Sarah continued to live at the Post Office with her son who was a Hotel Manager, until she died in August 1946. William Thomas was now the new owner of Lorne Terrace and his tenants were Mr W. Fisher, Mrs Giles, Mr Hockney and Miss Fisher.

In October 1947 William Thomas Cressey sold the property to Ada Jane Jackson who was the wife of Benjamin Jackson of Skirlaugh. For well over 100 years the 4 houses that are Lorne Terrace were bought and sold as a whole but that was all about to change. On 20th February 1957 Ada Jane Jackson sold no 2 to Edward Leonard Giles and on Christmas Eve of that year she sold no 1 to Don Grimwood. Ada died in February 1968 and her son's Harry and Clive inherited no's 3 & 4. Twenty years later in November 1988 the brothers sold no 4 to Stephen Rowland Jacobs and Patricia Jacobs. Then in March 1997 they sold no 3 to me !

THE BRANSHOLME OLYMPIC BID FOR 2004.

The people of Bransholme have made a late bid to host the 2004 Olympiad. However, it has been requested that some of the events and traditions be modified to ensure that our local athletes have a better chance of winning medals. The International Olympic Committee has been respectfully asked to consider establishing the Olympic Village in 'The Garth's' (where showers will be installed and in full working order as soon as the copper piping is returned, but arrangements have been made to use the Foredyke Drain if not returned in time.)

(C) "Our Tracy's up the duff". (D) "I'm up the duff". Or (E) "The woman up the road's up the duff and she says its yours!"
5. TUG OF WAR - Chains will be fixed to the concrete bollards at the Roebank Arcade shops. The winning team will be the ones who hauls its bollards out the quickest. (Use of 4x4's is not permitted).
6. RELAY RACE - In this race batons will be substituted with handbags. And will be renamed as the bag-snatching race. All entrants will be tested for drugs and the traditional bike and old lady will be banned.
7. SHOT PUTT - House bricks to be hurled from various distances at suitable plate glass windows, e.g. the Chemist on North Bransholme, the Newsagents or traffic on Noddle Hill Way.
8. MARATHON - Athletes who enter must be police dog trained and be able to pack a Wheely-bin in ten seconds flat to qualify, (pushchairs will not count).
9. DUO CYCLING - The Committee are unanimous in their ruling that tandems are for puffs, but most normal bikes will accommodate two to six people. As this was the Annual Parish meeting of the Withernwick Parish Council it was an open meeting, which was attended by 4 members of the public, ERYC Councillor J Waslin. 4 Parish Councillors were present after the resignation of Councillor Wood and Councillor Fawcett. Police inspector Carl Shepherd also attended this meeting. Items that were discussed were a village Christmas tree, outlining planning permission on East Lambwath Road, and the Jubilee coins for the village children. All of the resident village children under 16 year old, can collect their commemorative coins from the Village Hall on MONDAY 3RD JUNE AT 10am.

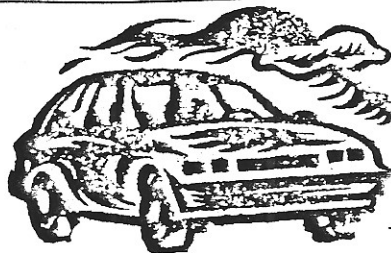
RACE FOR LIFE

ST ALBANS CHURCHYARD

Withernwick Parish Council

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council has drawn attention to the possibility that some of the headstones in this Churchyard may be in a dangerous condition. Accordingly, and on that Councils advice, arrangements have been made for a Risk assessment to be undertaken by a qualified Stonemason recommended by that council. Should this assessment identify any dangerous headstones, further work will be required to make them safe. In the meantime, visitors to the Churchyard should be aware of the situation and take extra care during their visit, especially if accompanied by children. It is emphasised that this Churchyard is not a playground.



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And finally.....

Nature Watch..... The lesser bald bustard has been recently spotted taking up his habitat in this part of East Yorkshire, after escaping the very cold months in southern climes. Because of its rarity we cannot give an exact location but Withernwick has certainly been near the centre of his activities. Twitchers will know from experience some of the antics and displays he gets up to at this time of year - a sure sign that the worst of the winter is behind us. We have watched with amusement his almost human displays of territorial defence. He has an almost pathological need to make sure that entry and exit from his nest is not impeded in any way and indeed he devotes an inordinate amount of energy to this activity. Attired in his winter plumage he blends well into his surroundings but keen watchers will be rewarded for their patience by his occasional forays into neighbouring territory to establish dominance over other species. No definite sightings have been made of his mate but the female is usually shy and easily startled. Further sightings will be reported in the next edition - so keep twitching!
