From The Vicar May 2015

I nearly forgot to let Paul have the information for this newsletter in time this month — it was only a chance phone call asking me if it was too late to send things in that reminded me that May was nearly upon us! Where did April go, I wonder? I blame the fact that the garden calls for my attention at this time of year and the lovely weather we've been having entices me outside rather than at my computer — excuses, I know but . . .

May is apparently the month when the ancient pagans used to get up to 'all sorts'! The Romans held their festival to honour the mother-goddess Maia, goddess of nature and growth, and the early Celts celebrated the feast of Beltane, in honour of the sun god, Beli. For centuries May was a time of indulgence and merriment after the hardship of winter, nature in all its glory is seen at the

beginning of May.

In 1833 Robert Owen's had a vision of a millennium in the future, beginning on May Day, when there would be no more poverty, injustice or cruelty, but harmony and friendship. Whilst this visions may emulate the Christian faith there has never been a Christian content to May Day, but nevertheless there is the well-known 6am service on the top of Magdalen Tower at Oxford where a choir sings in the dawn of May Day.

It seems that this year we too are up to 'all sorts'. The Church calendar honours us with Rogation, Ascension Day, Pentecost and Trinity Sunday. Saints Days include Philip, James, Matthias, Patrick and our own St Helen (of St Helen's Well, Great Hatfield). We have a wedding and 4 baptisms. North and South Holderness are coming together at St Bartholomew's Aldbrough for the Admission of Churchwardens by the Archdeacon! Christian Aid Week begins on 10th May. The nation is gearing up for a General Election and Europe is commemorating 70 years since the end of WWII. PHEW!

The Celtic Knot symbol on the front cover this month is known as a TRIQUETRA or the Trinity Knot. The Celts were very familiar with the idea of the trinity, everything came in threes; the three stages of womanhood: maid, mother, crone, and the three elements: earth, fire, water and Christianity embraced this knot to include a circle

that goes through the three interconnected loops of the Triquetra. As with most Celtic Knots there is no obvious beginning or ending hence symbolizing God's everlasting love through the Holy Trinity.

Whatever you are up to this May, I hope that you will find some time for yourselves and for God.

Votewise 2015 - making a difference at the ballot box and beyond "We are a nation of disaffected voters. The last three elections have seen the lowest turnout in living memory and there's no indication that 2015 will be any different... With the threat of a hung parliament, a drastic charge up of the Union wit seems a handless time for politics." So writes

shake-up of the Union... it seems a hopeless time for politics." So writes Guy Brandon, in his timely new book, *Votewise 2015*, a guide to Christians

facing the General Election.

Yet Brandon insists that "as Christians, hopelessness is not something we can afford, much less subscribe to." And so *Votewise 2015* aims to help Christians consider the main issues from a Christian perspective: the economy, debt and austerity; Europe and immigration; the environment; the NHS; education.

"Taking the trip to the polling station once every five years is not the beginning and end of political engagement – especially for Christians, who are taught to pray 'Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth, as it is in heaven.' We are commanded to seek transformation here on earth, not simply to sit back and wait for the Age to Come.

"God did not intend for politicians to bear full responsibility for transforming an imperfect world. That responsibility lies, first and foremost, with Christians." Brandon says.

So as well as prayer and bottom-up local initiatives, he also encourages Christians to effect change by getting involved in direct engagement with the political process: "lobbying your council, joining a party, becoming a councillor yourself, writing to your MP or visiting one of their surgeries: all the activity that occurs the other four years and 364 days before the next General Election. Although change can be slow, it is absolutely valid for Christians to seek to change a faulty system, as well as to address its injustices. For *Christians not voting is not an option!*

Vote for churches - Party leaders reveal their favourite churches

The National Churches Trust has revealed the favourite churches of the seven party leaders who are taking part in the 2015 General Election.

They range from St Bartholomew the Great, one of London's oldest and most historic churches, to Soar Ffrwdamos in Penygraig, a chapel in the heart of the Rhonnda valley and Fisherton Church in Dunure, located on the coast of the Firth of Clyde.

The Rt Hon David Cameron, Leader of the Conservative Party, has chosen All Saints Church, Church Lane, Spelsbury, Oxfordshire and St Mary the Virgin Church, Church Green, Witney, Oxfordshire. He says: "All Saints at Spelsbury (is) where my family sometimes worship when we are at home in Oxfordshire. It has a very special memory of my late son, Ivan's, christening. Another church I have great affection for in my constituency is St Mary the Virgin in Witney. I have the honour of being one of the Patrons for the Appeal for Restoration and Renewal."

The Rt Hon Ed Miliband, Leader of the Labour Party, has chosen St Mary Magdelene Church, High Street, Campsall, Doncaster. "St Mary Magdalene is said to be the church were Robin Hood and Maid Marian were married. As strong believers in redistribution, the people of #Doncaster North are happy to reclaim his roots. I am proud to have this church in my constituency."

The Rt Hon Nick Clegg, Leader of the Liberal Democrats, chose St Nicholas' Church, Town Gate, High Bradfield, Bradfield, South Yorkshire. "This stunning 15th century Grade One listed church is situated within High Bradfield in my Sheffield Hallam constituency. ... it can be seen for miles around and offers great views across the valleys."

The Rt Hon Nicola Sturgeon MSP, Leader of the Scottish National Party, chose Fisherton Parish Church, Dunure, South Ayrshire. "I was christened in Fisherton Church in Dunure. It is a picturesque and peaceful place, with nearby castle, harbour and lookout tower. It's a place I loved as a child and still means a great deal to my family."

Leanne Wood AM, Leader of Plaid Cymru, chose Soar Ffrwdamos in Penygraig, Rhondda. "Soar is a vital part of the community as it facilitates all kinds of groups, from all backgrounds and from all sectors of Rhondda society."

Nigel Farage MEP, Leader of the UK Independence Party, chose St Thomas à Becket Church, Fairfield, Romney Marsh, Kent. "A uniquely situated church in the middle of the marsh. Quite enchanting."

Natalie Bennett, Leader of the Green Party of England and Wales, chose St Bartholomew the Great, West Smithfield, London. "Laying a hand on the walls dating back to Henry I, I reflect back on the many tumultuous events they've witnessed, and survived, from the Great Fire to the Blitz."

Since 1953, the National Churches Trust has provided £85 million worth of funding, at today's prices, to help pay for urgent repairs and the installation of up to date facilities to places of worship of all the major Christian denominations. As spokesperson says: "Whatever the result of the 2015 General Election, we hope that politicians of all parties will continue to support the task of keeping churches, chapels and meeting houses looking beautiful and able to cope with the demands of the 21st century."
