

# Most popular Bible Stories: Who is the Baby?

This month we continue our series looking at the top ten Must Know Stories.

A little girl was examining a Christmas crib with her grandmother and commented, 'Grandma, it's really nice, but there's one thing that bothers me: is the baby Jesus ever going to grow up? He's the same size he was last year!!' As we continue with the top ten Must Know Stories, the birth of Jesus must be the most well-known. However, are we really growing in our understanding of this story?

The angels announced, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.' (Luke 2: 10,11). The birth of a baby is a time of great joy and excitement and Jesus' birth is good news for all people! He is none other than the king of the universe, who has come as our Saviour. To experience this joy, we must let go of self-centredness and living as our own saviour. His deliverance and wholeness is a real cause for joy!

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests.' (Luke 2:14). We may feel anything but peace with God, ourselves, or even with those closest to us at Christmas. How can a Jewish infant born to a peasant family in first century Palestine be the source of peace between God and man in the twenty first century? As the carol says, 'Joy to the world, the Lord has come, let earth receive her king.'

### From the Vicar December 2015

November's news was dominated by terrorist attacks throughout the world, with considerable loss of life, and we could be forgiven for wondering if and when there would ever be good news. It's astonishing how the epicentre of world news has always seemed to be what we call the 'Middle East'. Ever since history was first recorded, these lands have been its backdrop: great civilisations and powers, Babylon, Assyria, Egypt, and Persia occupied the world's centre stage, sometimes for centuries. Yet within these civilisations the world's two greatest religions, Christianity and Islam, were born out of an even older religion – Judaism. Roughly 2000 years ago in a field outside Bethlehem a message rang out: 'Peace, goodwill among people'. This is the great paradox. In the midst of conflict, in a land that had suffered enemy occupation for 300 years, there came a message of peace.

This message of peace in a fragile world is often difficult to see, but those words on our front cover this month echo it—there is light at the end of the tunnel so to speak. It is this light that we are preparing for throughout the month of December. 'Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you. Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see. Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness. Christ be our light! Shine in your church gathered today'. (Hymn by Bernadette Farrell) Over the next four weeks we shall gradually increase the light in our churches by lighting an extra candle on the Advent wreath until all 4 are lit symbolising the message of hope, love, joy and peace. The central white candle is lit on Christmas Day itself.

During this time people will gather to sing carols and hear again the timeless truths of the gospel. Our carol services will range from the extremely traditional nine lessons and carols, with readings from the King James Bible at Mappleton, to services which incorporate meditations on the passages of scripture. The choir, and instrumentalists, will lead us and they too have different music for each service. So although the message is essentially the same at each carol service the content is varied and challenging – you are always welcome to services in churches other than your own!

Life and Human Rights in Palestine

Ann Farr serves as an Ecumenical Accompanier on the World Council of Churches Programme in Palestine and Israel and she came to Aldbrough and to Withernwick to talk about her experiences living in a village in the north of the West Bank. The villagers here mainly live as shepherds and tenders of olive groves. Life is very hard because the villagers suffer from the changing definition of boundaries between Palestine and Israel. Israeli settlers are moving in ever closer and taking over the land with the villagers having no redress to compensation or to any form of assistance from a young and often frightening army. One of the most alarming sights was the 30ft high concrete wall which separates Palestine from Israel and communites from work, hospitals and family. Ann and her colleagues record people's stories and report them to the United Nations. They aim to raise awareness of injustice and the denial of human rights.

The peace making process has a long way to go.

Ann also brought lots of small items for sale, among them small pieces carved from olive wood and actually made by a couple called Joseph and Mary.

Among the leaflets she brought was one from Pax Christi. It offered a Muslim, Jewish and Christian Prayer for Peace and finishes with these words:

Give to us:

Understanding that puts an end to strife;

Mercy that quenches hatred, and

Forgiveness that overcomes vengeance.

Empower all people to live in your law of love.
