As we approach the beginning of February it seems that spring is nearly here - there are certainly plenty of bulbs popping up in the Vicarage garden and we're looking forward to seeing what is there! Add to this Valentine's Day in the middle of the month I guess there is an air of expectation all around.

The church begins February with an ancient feast that marks both a looking back to Christmas and a looking forward to Easter with the story of the young child Jesus being presented in the Temple as was the custom for all at the time. At the Temple were two prophets Simeon and Anna who were both anticipating God's coming among his people. Simeon's words have become immortalised in what we call the Nunc Dimittis in which he refers to Jesus as a light to lighten the Gentiles'. Accordingly from the 7th century to February 2nd was made into a feast of candles hence Candlemas.

Candlemas, though, also has pagan roots as it lies half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, so it marks the day when winter is half over!! In the Celtic calendar it was known as Imbolc – and centred around the lighting of fires to celebrate the increasing power of the sun over the coming months. As Candlemas traditions evolved a legend also sprang up that if the sun shone on 2nd February an animal would see its shadow and there would be 6 more weeks of winter!

Nonetheless, the feast of Candlemas enables us to focus on Jesus as the light of the world. It is this light that has inspired hymn writers over the centuries and none more so than Graham Kendrick's 'Shine, Jesus, shine'. The first verse simply says: 'Lord the light of your love is shining, in the midst of the darkness, shining: Jesus, light of the world, shine upon us, set us free by the truth you now bring us. Shine on me.

May Christ's light and love shine in our hearts this month.

Chocolate Walnut Pastries

You can serve these little pastries at a brunch as a sweet roll, as dessert as part of a tray of little cakes, or as cookies. You can use Hot Water Pastry instead of the refrigerated premade doughs if you'd like.

Prep Time: 20 minutes
Cook Time: 10 minutes
Total Time: 30 minutes
Yield: Makes 32 pastries
Ingredients:

2 crust pkg. refrigerated pie crusts, or homemade pie crusts
1 cup ground walnuts
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 egg
1 cup semisweet chocolate chips, divided

Preparation:

Let pie crust pouches sit at room temperature for 15 minutes. If using <u>homemade crusts</u>, chill for 1 hour after rolling into circles. Melt 2/3 cup of the chocolate chips in small saucepan over low heat. Remove from heat and add ground walnuts, powdered sugar, and egg, and mix well until combined.

Preheat oven to 200 degrees C Unroll pie crusts according to package directions, or remove prepared homemade crusts from refrigerator; roll pie crusts into 12" rounds. Cut each crust into 16 wedges. Place a rounded 1 teaspoon chocolate mixture on the wide end of each wedge and gently spread out to form a layer. Roll up the dough, starting at wide end and rolling to the point. Place point side down on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake the pastries at 200 degrees C for 8-12 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool completely. Melt remaining chocolate in small saucepan over low heat. Drizzle over cooled pastries.
