From the Vicar July 2014

One of the gospel stories this month is The Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13.1-9, 18-23). It seems to be a particularly apt parable at this time of year as the gardens and allotments are really coming into their own and keeping us all busy. Rather like this parable things that we sow don't always end up in the right places and quite often things appear that we didn't plant!

But what about the sower in this parable - was he simply being careless since only one of his sowings was actually really successful? This was a story told by Jesus to illustrate God's kingdom and as such it can also be about the choices we make throughout our earthly life.

In Chapter 3 of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, 'The Letters From No One,' Uncle Vernon refuses to give Harry a letter addressed to him. But hundreds of letters keep arriving. Uncle Vernon moves Harry and the family from place to place hoping to make the letters stop, but the letters keep arriving with the new address, e.g. "the cupboard under the stairs," "the smallest bedroom," "Railview Hotel," and finally "the floor, Hut on the Rock, the Sea." The letter is an invitation to become a student at Hogwarts. When Hagrid finally delivers it personally to Harry he tells Harry that he is a wizard, a much loved one. Like the sower, Hagrid scatters his letters in abundance everywhere that Harry might get them. Like the seed, the letters tell Harry who he is and invite him to an incredible new future.

We too are invited to an incredible new future, not necessarily a 'magical one' (although it may be), but one in which we are cared for, loved and nurtured. However, this takes time - there is no quick fix!

The images of growth in this parable remind us that the Christian life is not something static or even settled. We have to keep on growing in faith and in the knowledge of God. We can choose to do this on our own, but it is a lot easier when we are a part of a community of faith. Our growth in faith will be precarious at times, there will be moments when it seems as if the Word of God has fallen on stony ground, but there will be times when it seems more deeply rooted in us. When we choose to receive the Word of God, the seed, then we too become sowers and enable others to grow alongside us.

May you sow in faith and leave the rest to God!
