# From the Vicar September 2014

Living here in this beautiful part of the world we cannot escape the fact that farmers have been very busy with their harvest - time will tell whether or not it has been a good one. Most cultures and religious traditions gather for an annual celebration to thank God (or the gods) for their harvest. This is of course nothing new in Old Testament times there were three Harvest Festivals - April/May: barley reaping; June/July: wheat harvest and in September/October the fruits of the tree or vine were gathered.

Somewhere on the planet it is always harvest time – hence the reason our eating habits have become less governed by the seasons. Nonetheless, it is good to keep a time every year when we remember to thank God 'the giver of all good things'. The celebration of Harvest traditionally marks the end of a process that began earlier in the year with the preparation of the soil and the sowing of seeds – with the aid of modern technology crops are grown throughout the year, so there is nearly always new growth to look forward to. New growth of course doesn't just apply to crops – it can also be a way of describing our spiritual growth as well. Spiritual growth is not automatic – like the crops we need encouragement and nurturing – hence the reason for running the Pilgrim Course in the Benefice. But how can we grow spiritually if we have forgotten or perhaps never known how to have a relationship with God the giver of all good things?

Ten years ago an initiative known as Back to Church Sunday began with the intention of encouraging people to either return to church or to find out more. This year the campaign is running a 'Season of Invitations' whereby people are individually invited to several different events beginning on 21st September. As this coincides with Harvest Festivals at both Withernwick and Goxhill, what better opportunity can we have to encourage someone to come to one of these services? If Sundays are difficult then why not come to the Harvest Festival at Mappleton on Thursday 18th September at 7.00pm. Looking ahead, Harvest at Aldbrough is at the beginning of October and will be a Flower Festival weekend.

Harvest Festivals challenge us to remember that everything is a gift from God - we are merely stewards of that gift. Perhaps one of the most popular harvest hymns, although an English translation of German words, is 'We plough the fields, and scatter the good seed on the land'. The words remind
